MARITIME BOARD OF TRADE.

We know of no institution or association that is practically of greater use and importance to the community than the Board of Trade. Local boards have done much towards opening and smoothing the ways of commerce in the various provinces, and the Maritime Board has been found advantageous in respect to matters affecting trade within the circuit of the Maritime Provinces, the Dominion, and the world at large. This year the annual meeting of the Maritime Board is to be held at Kentville, Nova Scotia. The topics for discussion, subject to final arrangement by committee, are as follows:—

1. Preferential Trade within the Empire.
2. Development of Canadian Trade with the West Indies.
3. Curriculum of our schools in relation to our industrial and commercial advancement.
4. What can be done to attract a desirable class of immigrants to the Maritime Provinces.
5. Daily mail service between Digby and St. John throughout the year.
6. Better hotel and other accommodations for tourists.
7. Rates of freight on apples.
8. Development of iron and steel industries.
9. Atlantic mail service on the basis of speed.
10. Legislative union Maritime Provinces.

Several of these questions are of merely academic interest. But there are others which are of practical importance. Such for instance, is the development of Canadian trade with the West Indies. This is a matter in which Prince Edward Island is directly and materially interested; and this Province ought to be well represented when it is discussed and the action of the Board is taken. "Better accommodation for tourists" is another question in the discussion of which the delegates of P. E. Island Boards of Trade may well take part, while "rates of freight on apples" is a matter that must hereafter come home to our local shippers as well as to those of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

It is pleasing to learn that the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade has nominated an efficient delegation; and we hope that the Summerside and Souris Boards will do so,—and that all will be ably represented at the coming meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade.

—If Canada is prosperous, the reports show that the United States are more prosperous. Yet certain politicians and newspapers here have the hardihood to claim that the activity of business in Canada is all due to the Tarte-Laurier administration.

NOT TO BE SIDE-TRACKED!

From the report of the annual meeting of the Farmers' and Dairymen's Association, now several weeks old, we learn that a reply to the resolution agreed to last winter at the semi-annual meeting, asking for better accommodation and freight rates on live stock to points on the Intercolonial railway, is in the hands of the secretary of the Association. Why have those replies not been published? The meeting which passed the resolutions was a large and impartial one and was composed of able representative men from every section of the province. The question embodied in the resolution and referred to the committee of railways and the minister of railways and the minister of marine, for their consideration, is one of the greatest importance to the farmers of this province. From the brief reference to the replies in the report of the Association meeting, we infer that neither of the heads of the department who control the transportation business of this province, have condescended to tell the farmers what they will do. The minister of marine has charge of the most important link in the chain of communication and the one which most urgently needs reform; but he remains silent and gives no sign of remorse,—while the minister of railways replies through his deputies the superintendents at Moncton and Charlottetown. Is this a seemly way to treat a great farmers' convention, like that of last winter at Marshfield, when it asks for fair treatment?

We select this morsel from our discreet contemporary. While The Guardian is right in saying that THE EXAMINER believes in protection—a moderate incidental protection—for Canadian industries, it is altogether wrong when it says that THE EXAMINER condemns the government "for having left the tariff as protective as it ever was." We condemn the government because its members throughout twenty long years denounced Protection as "radically unsound" as "unjust to the masses of the people," as an "evil" in itself, "a huge scheme of robbery" a "villainous system," "an accursed system, accursed of God and man," and, having promised that when elected to office they would "put away from the soil of Canada the last vestige of Protection,"—they continue to maintain protection.

This fact, as we submit, proves, beyond a doubt, that they are dishonest politicians, not to be trusted, and so to be voted out at the first opportunity.

Conduct such as their's in respect to protection would, in respect to any private transaction, be declared misleading, deceptive and fraudulent by ninety-nine men out of a hundred, and the perpetrators of it would be deemed unworthy of trust. So we ask the independent electors of Prince Edward Island at the first opportunity, to vote out the false, vote in the true.

The Guardian, it will be observed, admits the deception and fraud practised by the Government. It says "that they undoubtedly denounced protection in their speeches when in opposition." Why does it not, then, condemn them for taking credit to themselves for the prosperity which prevails under protection, which they have maintained, and ask the electors to vote them out on account of their deception.
