Strong Possibility Held 2nd P.E.I. National Park

OTTAWA — There is a strong possibility that Prince Edward Island will have a second national park in the not too distant future.

Solicitor General J. Watson MacNaught said here Wednesday that he has been meeting with the minister of northern affairs and natural resources, Arthur Laing, on the subject and Mr. Laing has said that he will give sympathetic consideration to any request from the Prince Edward Island government for a shore line survey to determine if there are some suitable pieces of land available for such a park.

MacNaught said that there is a precedent for a second park in P.E.I. because a second national park has recently been approved for Nova Scotia. The P.E.I. park had the largest attendance of any national park in Canada last year and the facilities are badly overcrowded.

Mr. MacNaught is flying to the island on Thursday and hopes to be in attendance at a dinner for British High Commission

U.S. Oppose N-Arms At Risk of Election

OTTAWA (CP) — The heat of the minority Liberal government on all but the nuclear issue as far as the New Democrats are concerned.

New Democratic Leader C. C. Douglas made this plain at a press conference Wednesday in Ottawa. He said the Liberal Cabinet is to take a limited part in that province's election campaign.

Mr. Douglas, who returned a few hours earlier from a month-long European tour, put forward two main points:

1. The New Democrats will do all they can to stop the agreement with the United States under which Canada will acquire a major warhead even if that means an election. 2. The NDP promise earlier this year to give the Liberals a "fair and reasonable" time to bring in a program runs until the next session of Parliament.

On the nuclear question, he said his European trip was meant to give the impression that Canada is adding nothing to the security of the Western world by acquiring nuclear weapons and it is making it more difficult to contain the spread of nuclear arms to other countries.

PM Sees Malaysian Plan Faced

UNITED NATIONS (CP) — Prime Minister Pearson of Canada said Wednesday it would be "preposterous" if the United Nations should collapse for a "bagatelle" of a few million dollars.

He said at a press conference on the eve of his speech before the UN General Assembly that there is a "real danger" the UN's Congo peace-keeping operation will end for lack of funds.

He would like to see the Congo operation continue as long as UN Secretary-General U Thant thought it was important. That had said the Congo mission was still needed.

Pearson said Canada will continue to contribute to the Congo force in men and money as long as required. But he stressed the mission should be a collective UN responsibility.

MEANS TO AN END
Pearson said the apparent refusal atmosphere in the UN is only means to an end and operative action to resolve East-West disputes.

He suggested that a German settlement, including the 11.5 steps toward disarmament and a clean up of the situation in Germany would be moves which would illustrate a genuine easing of East-West tensions.

In the UN's general committee, Canada voted with 11 other members to put the question of Communist Chinese membership on the agenda. Nationalist China voted against and eight countries, including the United States, abstained.

Canada's Liberal party thus discharged its 1961 promise not to oppose consideration of Red Chinese membership.

Some Island Gravel Okayed For Airport

OTTAWA — Solicitor General J. Watson MacNaught's office reported Wednesday that Mr. MacNaught has been able to ensure that some portion of the gravel to be used in the mammoth reconstruction program at the Summerside airport will be Island gravel.

Mr. MacNaught has been working for the past 10 days with officials of the department of national defence and defence construction and his office said that some Island gravel will now be used in the project.

Originally, the specifications called for only mainland gravel to be used for the base material under the asphalt top. This is because some of the work done three years ago with Island gravel did not stand up, necessitating the repair and reconstruction work on the aprons, taxiways and runways at the RCAF station.

However, government officials have agreed that certain types of Island gravel, found in pits in the West Prince area, is a suitable for the work and this gravel will be used in the extent that it is available.

Tenders on the big project closed Wednesday. It is expected to be a week or 10 days before any announcement of a contract will be made.

A spokesman for Mr. MacNaught said the decision to include some Island gravel in the work will be a tremendous boost to the trucking industry in Prince County.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Los Angeles scored an unearned run in the 13th inning Wednesday night for a 6-5 victory that gave them a sweep of their crucial three-game series with St. Louis and shoved the Cardinals four games behind of the National League leading Dodgers.

Prime Minister Tunku Abdul Rahman announced the armed services buildup amid increasing tension here following the burning of the British Embassy in Jakarta, Indonesia, by thousands of rioters.

In Jakarta, the embassy and the British Cricket Club were destroyed by crowds of angry youths carrying clubs, iron bars and other weapons. At least 15 members of the embassy staff were reported killed.

Following about two hours of major rioting, United States Ambassador Howard Jones said the Jakarta situation was not serious and that he was planning to take control of the situation.

Rahman told reporters he has received assurances from British Colonial Secretary Duncan Sandys that Britain is ready to defend the independence and integrity of the two-day-old union of Malaysia, Singapore, Sarawak and Sabah (formerly British North Borneo).

JAAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — A grim, methodical mob of 1,000 Indonesian sacked and burned the British Embassy and other British property Wednesday in protest against British support of the newly formed union of Malaysia, Singapore, Sarawak and Sabah. Troops appeared to have restored order.

The troops of the Jakarta garrison spread out across the city in apparent response to a demand by the British government that Indonesia protect British lives and property against mob violence or risk a diplomatic break. President Sukarno's government was told bluntly to stop such "unethical behavior."

Rioters finally deserted the site of the modern, three-story Embassy building, which smoldered as a burned-out shell, its own littered with the ashes of a-armed guards and an abandoned car were stationed at the deluxe Indonesia Hotel across the way. British Embassy personnel and their families were taken in the hotel for the night.

The British Cricket Club is a fashionable residential section of the capital and the Shell Oil Company's residential compound in the suburb of Kebonjoran also were set fire in the days' fury. At least 19 British cars were put to the torch, nine in and around the embassy compound.

"KILL THE ENGLISH!"
The rioters vented their wrath in a series of slogans: "Crush Malaysia," "Crush the British," and "Kill the English."

Malaysia, an anti-Communist country's arms buildup would include a reserve call-up, increasing the strength of the armed forces and extending them to Sarawak and Sabah.

HITS INDONESIA
The press conference, Rahman lashed out sharply at Indonesia and its ally, the Philippines, but emphasized the federation wanted peace and friendship with its neighbors.

Indonesia, he said, "expected us to take it lying down because so long we have been trying to appease them."

"We have had despicable treatment from people we have regarded as our friends," Rahman said.

The prime minister said British forces in Malaysia were informed of the defence preparations and "formal advice" would be given to the United States.

Asked if he thought a further summit meeting with Indonesian President Sukarno would alleviate the situation, Rahman replied:

"Is this the use? I went to Tokyo and spoke with him and he was very confrontational. I went to Manila and spoke with them (the Philippine government) and they were with withdrawal of ambassadors. It is a waste of time and money when the mob will not abide by decisions taken at conferences."

Within hours, Diah's embassy put out a conciliatory statement which said Sukarno's government deposed the incidents in Jakarta. He added that measures had been taken to protect British interests.

The British embassy then had a second brief talk with Lord Home at the foreign secretary's bidding. He said he hoped to have a firm official answer to Rome's blistering demands later today.

BRITISH NOT UNLIKELY
British authorities said privately that a diplomatic break is likely if Indonesia fails to provide a satisfactory response.

British appeared to be infuriated most by the failure of Indonesian police and troops to make any effort to control the mob at the height of its destruction.

The Jakarta army garrison issued an appeal over Radio Indonesia at 11 p.m. Wednesday for a halt to the illegal action, disarming, seizure of property, mob-striking of people, strikes, disrupting transportation and communications.

Guard posts were established at various points in the first show of force since the outbreak of the rioting yesterday aftermath to stoning of the British and Malaysian Embassies here Monday.
