# Record Spending Plans Revealed In N.B. Budget

FREDERICTON (CP) — Record spending with no increase in taxes was forecast Friday by Finance Minister L. G. Des Brisay in his budget speech to the New Brunswick legislature. Expenditures of \$145,468,000 with revenues of \$145,946,000 indicate a surplus on current account of \$477,800 for the 1965-66 fiscal year beginning April 1. Spending during the 1964-65 fiscal year, which ends March 31, is forecast at \$130,308,000, with revenue at \$133,137,000.

## Truck Fees Cut Urged For Farmers, Fishermen

Arthur MacDonald (L-5th Kings) said in the Legislature yesterday he would like to see the government give consideration to setting lower truck registration fees for farmers and fishermen. Speaking in the draft address debate, Mr. MacDonald said that in many cases farmers and fishermen use trucks for short periods in their occupations yet the minimum registration period is six months. Mr. MacDonald said the government's intention to set up larger units of administration in the province's elementary school system is "out of line with the thinking of most people." He said it would be "too much" for small children to be transported 10 or 15 miles to primary school units and be away from home "seven to eight hours" a day.

## Resolution On Spuds Will Be Redrafted

A resolution, dealing with the province's potato industry, and introduced in the Legislature yesterday is to be redrafted because of objections to its political overtones before it again comes up for discussion. The resolution, introduced by Arthur MacDonald (L-5th Kings), calls on the government to "do something in conjunction with other potato growing areas of Eastern Canada to stabilize the price" of potatoes and further recommends that "small potato farmers be assisted co-operatively to obtain the proper packaging facilities."

## Resolution On Spuds Will Be Redrafted

Andrew MacRae, objected to a phrase in the preamble of the resolution which read "whereas the present government has done little with regard to potato marketing..." Another Conservative suggested that the preamble be amended to apply to the "present federal government," while a Liberal member suggested it read "while the present federal and provincial governments."

Premier Shaw said the potato industry is far too important to be the victim of a political "scramble in the Legislature" and suggested the redrafting of the resolution. The premier said he agreed with the principle of the resolution but wanted the political overtones removed.

Already we have completed a foundation study of the feasibility of a \$100,000,000 scheme to harness tidal power down the Bay of Fundy... Emmanuel Adelaard, president of the Annapolis Valley Boards of Trade, said, "this could change the entire industrial picture in the Maritimes."

## Stock Breeders Reject Move To Integrate With New Fair

AMHERST (CP) — The annual meeting of the Maritime Stock Breeders Association here Friday rejected a motion that it integrate with the Atlantic Winter Fair in Halifax. A second motion, that the association's executive explore the possibility of reviving the Maritime Winter Fair when the new formula on federal grants for fairs and exhibitions goes into effect, was passed by majority vote leaving the association hopeful of re-establishing the fair in Amherst.
