LA GRIPPE. This peculiar malady is again very prevalent in Charlottetown. In some cases entire families are in its grasp.

ENGINEERS.—A meeting of the non-commissioned officer of the Charlottetown Engineers will be held in their rooms, Lyceum, this evening at 8 o'clock. Important.

THE TEMPERATURE.—The lowest temperature between Saturday night and Sunday morning was 2 above zero. The highest on Sunday was 22 above. The lowest last night was 16 above, and the highest today, up to 1 o.m., was 35 above.

COUNTY COURT.—The County Court of Queen's County opens in Charlottetown tomorrow at 11 o'clock with 291 cases on the docket. Judgment in the suit of Massey Harris Co. vs. Walter B. Robertson, reserved from last term, will be delivered at the opening of the Court.

BOSTON SICK.—Late advices from Boston report upwards of 150,000 cases of sickness in that city. There were 341 deaths in one week. Few houses have escaped la grippe, and it is said that the unusual death rate is directly and indirectly due to this peculiar malady.

A QUICK TRIP.—By cable from St. John's, Nfld., this morning, Captain Benoit announces the arrival of the schooner Evelyne from Oporto, Portugal, all well. Captain Benoit made the round trip in 38 days, two of which he was waiting for orders while his charter was being negotiated.

SPECIAL LENTEN SERMONS.—Rev. A. P. McLellan, rector of St. Dunstan's College, preached the fourth of the series of special Lenten sermons in St. Dunstan's Cathedral last evening, his subject being "Christ, the Mediator." The subject was treated in a scholarly way. The attendance was very large.

THE STANLEY.—The Stanley will leave for Pictou tomorrow morning at 7 o'clock, with a general cargo including 28 dressed hogs, 68 quarters of beef, 84 barrels pork, 50 barrels meats, 22 cheese, 95 pails lard, 3 cases lard, 18 cases of canned goods, 9 rolls leather, 6 sacks wool, 6 barrels sheepskins and 109 boxes sundries. Her inward cargo on Saturday was composed of 97 cases oranges, 300 barrels flour and 537 cases and boxes miscellaneous goods among which was a quantity of dry goods. There is considerable indignation among shippers because the Stanley did not move out today as expected.

A TERRIBLE ENDING.—Islanders who have been in the lumber woods at Lincoln, New Hampshire, give the particulars of a distressing accident which occurred there a short time ago. It seems that a man named Mat. McKay was working about one of the lumber wagons and things were not going as smoothly as he would like. McKay began to blaspheme at a shocking rate, and among other things called upon Almighty God to kill him if He were able to do so. An instant later McKay was crushed to death under the heavily-laden team. McKay was about thirty years of age, and belonged to the United States.
