He stressed the value of supplementary teaching aids, and supplementary reading for all grades. "If a child learns nothing else but how to read well he has not wasted his time in school," Mr. Gallant said.

WLA Amendment Urged By Legion Convention

BORDEN — A resolution urging the federal government to amend the Veterans Land Act so as to allow town or city dwelling veterans eligible to obtain houses under the same conditions as rural veterans are now able to do so, was approved by the Provincial Command convened at Borden this Saturday.

The convention was held Saturday at Borden with J. Hamilton Douglas, Mount Stewart, presiding.

It was explained that at the present time the Veterans Land Act is applicable only to the building or acquiring of houses with a half-acre of land. This condition usually works to the disadvantage of town or city dwelling veterans where building lots are smaller, and if larger lots are required to meet present VLA conditions, the costs of services and assessments destroy any advantage of building with VLA assistance.

The resolution was sponsored by the Souris Branch and the Queens County zone.

22 REPRESENTED The convention which was attended by representatives of all 22 branches of the Legion in the province was officially opened by Lieutenant-Governor F. Walter Hyndman who laid the wreath at the Borden war memorial.

The hand of RCMP Station Summerside, under the direction of Sgt. W. Conkey, was present for the memorial service and march past at the opening ceremonies.

Lieutenant-Governor Hyndman also presented the past president's medal to Frank Rush at the opening ceremonies.

One member of the executive, R. M. Martin, Montague, declined to serve again as executive-president due to pressure of personal business, and Pius Smith, Charlottetown, was elected to the post. This was the only change in the executive for the new year.

Hon. Myles Murray, St. John's, Nfld., vice-chairman of the Dominion Command, was the guest speaker at the annual banquet Saturday evening. He urged the continued support of the Legion among the Atlantic Provinces and especially in Legion work.

(Continued From Page 1) tion of the Trans Canada Highway and the York Point Road. Although vehicle damage in both cases was reported to be heavy, none of the occupants of either vehicle suffered anything more than a shaking up.

The accident at Marshfield occurred sometime between 10.30 and 11.00 o'clock Sunday. The exact time of the third accident was not fully determined.

At Marshfield, Perry, Souris, was transporting a patient from Rollo Bay, to Charlottetown by ambulance. As he approached Marshfield he said to have observed a car ahead of the ambulance travelling in the same direction.

According to Mr. Perry, the driver of the car ahead was in the set of turning into a driveway, when she apparently became startled by the ambulance's siren and stopped her car with the rear end protruding into the highway.

The ambulance plowed into the right rear corner of the car. The front end of the ambulance sustained extensive damage and was immobilized, while the car suffered minor damage to the rear end.

In response to a call sent to Charlottetown, the Hennessy Funeral Home, proceeded to the scene and the patient was transferred to it for the final leg of the trip to Charlottetown.

The accident at York Point Road, involved only a 1953 Mercury.
