ACTION TAKEN TO COOL TEMPERATURE OF PARTIES

LONDON (AP)—Britain's government-owned central electricity generating board has taken action to lower the temperature of its office Christmas parties.

Officials directed the staff chiefs of briefing committees to patrol to break up any partying at the annual get-togethers.

Lord Robes, chairman of Britain's coal board, when told of the electricity board's action, said: "I wouldn't think of insulting our employees this way."

"Somebody always wants to knock the fun out of Christmas. This year the Scrooges are cracking down on staff parties."

The central electricity generating board is sending their staff to have his work on Christmas parties. The message advises that anti-partying patrols should roam the corridors and break up affectation situations.

"Anyone who thinks he can keep remote out of offices is going to have his work cut out... so long as there are men and women in the world there will be some who will And people who are adult enough to earn a living should be able to support themselves without being spoiled on by office officials."

The board was not the only government-owned authority to take note of Christmas office parties.
