U.K. Labor Party Fears Election Chances Dimming

By FRASER WIGHTON LONDON (Reuters) - The Labor party gathers for its annual conference today amid growing fears that Labor's chances of winning the next general election are steadily receding.

A year ago, when the Conservative government's stock was at a spectacularly low level following the Suez crisis, the Labor party was spoiling for a fight and confident that an early election would sweep it back into power.

But Sunday the prestige of British Prime Minister Macmillan's administration is shown by public opinion polls to be steadily rising, and the Labor party's

little advantage. Many voters in by-elections favored alternative third candidates rather than the Labor party.

The emergence of the welfare state has itself outmoded most of the slogans of the old revolutionary Labor party and so far there is no sign of a magic formula that will win it the next election.

Ironically, the leaders, for the first time in many years, have no need to appeal to the conference for party unity and the burying of internal feuds such as used to split it from top to bottom.

The electoral situation is considered far too serious for squabbling now.

AGRICULTURAL NEWS

RURAL YOUTH FAIR All roads lead to Charlottetown and the Rural Youth Fair tomorrow. This is the climax of the year's activities for all 4-H Club members.

The various projects have been carried out and the competitions have been carried out on the club level. Now is the time to meet in Provincial classes. It is an opportunity to see how the other clubs have been doing during the year.

Tomorrow, Thursday evening, the programme will commence at 7.30 p.m. in the Women's Institute building at the Provincial Exhibition Grounds.

One of the outstanding features of each year's Fair is the Public Speaking Contest. This year will see a few changes. The number of contestants has been limited to the County winners.

The evening's programme will be climaxed by a Square dance. Keith LeClachure and his Old Time Orchestra will provide the 'Down Beat'.

This is an opportunity to see the 4-H Club Members in action. PROVINCE HARVEST Since Prince Edward Island is primarily an agricultural province, it is only proper that the farmers of the Island should have a chance to show their field crops.

The Harvest Exhibition gives them this chance. Island farmers can, and some do produce crops which are second to none.

If you attend this Exhibition, you will see some of the best vegetables, fruit, potatoes, root crops grain and hay grown on P.E.I. This will show you what kind and quality products can be grown here.

It should encourage those as producers to turn out better products and those as consumers to buy Island products. STORAGE SANITATION

Is it this time of year that operators of fruit and vegetable storages should be thinking of a clean-up program. Too frequently decayed produce, broken boxes, soiled wraps, and other debris from the previous season is left

around throughout the summer. Just before the new crops are harvested a hasty attempt at cleaning up is made-the trash going out at the back as the fresh produce comes in at the front.

Such a practice is not only detrimental to the fresh produce, but to the building as well. The decayed produce breeds moulds and other organisms, causing musty smells which penetrate the insulation and structure generally and soon give the stored produce a musty or "storage" smell and taste.

These organisms also affect the building and cause rotting and disintegration of wooden parts.

Storage experts of the Department of Agriculture state that there is no substitute for cleanliness in combating these storage problems. In order that fungicides or germicides get a chance to do their job, storage must be thoroughly cleaned. After clearing out the debris, a scrubbing brush, soap and water and hard work is the best cleaner. In storage where steam is available, the task is easier.

When the storage is thoroughly clean, a fungicide can be used. Salts releasing chlorine are helpful in freshening up the storage. After spraying, the storage rooms should be closed for several days to permit penetration and then ventilated continuously with fresh air until the storage season begins.

LAMB FOR A CHANGE Now to the end of the year lamb will be in plentiful supply and apt to be a little lower in price. With lamb the so called tougher and cheaper cuts are still quite tender. Shoulder roast can be roasted with dry heat and shoulder chops broiled or pan-fried. Round bone shoulder chops are more tender than the blade chops. If you can get your butcher to one and roll the shoulder roast the carving problems will be simplified and the cheaper shank neck and breast meat will have been excluded.

Try lamb patties for quick dinners or for the children as lambburgers. Mock duck is another favorite, made from the outside of the shoulder and including shank, arm and blade. Lamb Kabobs, broiled or barbecued, are delicious and simple to prepare. Cut lamb (usually the shoulder) into one inch cubes, price alternately on skewers with either mushrooms or tomato wedges and slices of bacon, pineapple chunks, etc.

Have you heard of "Lamb in a Basket"? It sells for about the same price or sometimes even less than stew meat. It usually contains half the shoulder of lamb cut into two or three shoulder chops, a small blade which can be cut into chops if you wish, and about 1 1/2 lbs. of stewing meat.

TASK OF HOUSEWIVES Harvest time is danger time. With men out in the fields concerned about getting their crops in on time, rush is common, and often safety is sacrificed for speed. Tense and worried working attitudes may result.

The happy, worry-free individual usually makes a more concentrated, careful harvester. The wives must exert all their efforts at this time to produce harmonious conditions-good meals, cheerfulness, coffee breaks and the removal of annoyances and distractions. Attention paid to these factors will lessen fatigue-one of the major causes of farm accidents. It's a big job for the women.

Perhaps their job is made the harder because in addition they'll have their own busy canning season. Boiling water in large quantities and pre-school children underfoot no longer supervised by brothers and sisters who are now away at school.

Youngsters can't just be shoved outdoors either. They are continually wanting to experience things and so prove active rather than reflective. Their curious touching hands and attitudes place them in extremely dangerous positions around moving machinery, behind trucks and in out of the way places, where, because of their small size, they are overlooked.

Harvest time is danger time, a period when adults must be aware of safety hazards, and for their own sake and the sake of their children must be able to effectively cope with them before tragedies occur.

WOUNDS This is the separation of living tissue, and in sheep are usually caused by attacks from dogs or lacerations made by barbed wire. Ship's Sinking Remains Mystery

LONDON (Reuters) - The sinking of the Canadian-owned ship Nordic Star with its crew of 34 in the Atlantic in December, 1956, remains a complete mystery, an official report on the disaster said Tuesday.

"In all probability, the main factor was heavy weather although the exact circumstances and sequence of events leading to the loss cannot be ascertained from the report of the court of inquiry said Tuesday.

The 7,124-ton Nordic Star, built in Montreal in 1943, left Philadelphia Dec. 18.
