NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Liberal-Conservatives of Moncton have completed the organization of the Sir Charles Tupper Club. Success to it.

—It is announced that in two counties of the Province of Quebec the business men and farmers have reached an understanding whereby, at the next general election, men of business experience shall be brought out for Parliamentary honors.

—In view of two or three Provincial bye-elections and, probably, of a Dominion general election, the Federal Government is pushing on another survey of the Belfast and Murray Harbor railway, while a curve in the railway at Cornwall is engaging the attention of a large number of electors. Who would have thought, ten years ago, that the pure Liberals would have resorted to such means of influencing the results of elections.

—It may be safely assumed, says the Maritime Merchant, that, whatever success has attended on Canadian shipments of apples to Europe, is undoubtedly due to the care we have exercised in packing only good sound fruit in good uniform barrels, and if we keep up to the same standard we are bound to capture the cream of the trade and once this desirable object is accomplished, it will be difficult matter for our American competitors to wrest the business from us. That which is true in respect to apples, is true also in respect to everything that we send to the British markets. If the exports be good and sound, our farmers and shippers will be successful.

—Under an order of an Ontario division court judge, a Dominion civil servant was ordered to be brought up on a judgment summons to pay monthly instalments. Against this order an appeal was entered, the ground being taken that to bring the appellant up on such an order would be contrary to public policy, inasmuch as it would take him from his duties as a public officer. Chancellor Boyd before whom the appeal was heard, did not see the force of this objection and overruled it. It is better that the public service should suffer than that a dishonest civil servant should, in the law, find a place of refuge from whence he can defy his creditors. The argument is only a specious one; for public business will not suffer to the extent of one farthing because a civil servant is made to pay his debts.

—Death has been busy among the aged of Charlottetown and vicinity. Among those who have lately passed through the valley of the shadow, there was no more valuable citizen than Mr. William Boyle, of Prince Street. Quiet yet active, modest and retiring, yet enterprising and progressive, honest, steadfast, religious, he was in many respects a model man. In the course of a long life he accumulated a competency here and a goodly store for the hereafter, upon which he is now entered. He was a devout member of the Methodist congregation in Charlottetown. In recent years his health was not good and death gave him a happy release. We sympathise with his wife, with Dr. Boyle of Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, and Mrs. George E. Hughes; but the grief of those who are bereaved must in this case be assuaged by the knowledge that their loss is his gain.

— remarking upon the improvement this year in the price of cheese, the Maritime Merchant says that it is a well known fact that in some countries production has been curtailed on account of a number of factories going into butter making. The previous low range of prices for several seasons is responsible for this feature of the trade and doubtless it is just as well, for it has helped to restrict the production of cheese, and those continuing in that industry have

reaped the benefit in better prices. The butter-making facilities of the province have received an impetus which is bound to show good results in coming years both as regards quality of product and quantity turned out. The various reasons alleged for the prevailing higher range of cheese quotations in Great Britain include a shortage in the home product of serious proportions and this has caused the quick absorption of shipments from the Maritime Provinces and Montreal. There is always more pleasure and profit in handling goods at enhanced values than when they have been running along on a margin close to cost production. The feeling, therefore, in the local provinces with regard to cheese and butter trade during the past season is one which may be considered as satisfactory to a degree and much beyond the experience of several previous seasons.
