TURKEY AND GREECE.

Terms of the Settlement.

Sultan Disposed to be Reasonable.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 15.—Important Ministerial councils have been held at which the indemnity of six million pounds was agreed upon as the extreme limit of Turkey's concession. This agreement has been sanctioned by an Imperial Irade. The Sultan after considering the report answered as follows: "I am convinced that the efforts and energy of the Powers are directed solely for the maintenance of peace and the prevention of complications. It is the plain duty of Turkey, whose sentiments are likewise pacific, to put an end to the present abnormal situation. Consequently I command the Ministers to find the necessary means for concluding, if possible, the negotiations and sign the preliminaries for peace on Thursday next.

OTTAWA, July 15.—F. C. Lightfoot, a clerk to the engineer of the Public Works Department, has received his superannuation notice today.

Mr. Ouimet, clerk of the French Journal of the House of Commons, is dead.

Disastrous Gale.

PORTLAND, Me., July 15.—The unprecedented gale of Tuesday continued with increased fury yesterday. None of the coastwise steamers have left harbor for two days. Reports of disasters to shipping are coming in.

Loss of Fishermen.

BOSTON, July 15.—The schr. Golden Rule, arrived today from a fishing trip reports the loss of six fishermen of her crew while attending trawls. One was Nova Scotian.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

LONDON, July 12.—According to the Mark Lane Express it is generally estimated that the English wheat crop will show an average of 28 bushels to the acre, which is about 2 bushels below the normal.

LONDON, July 12.—A despatch from Montevideo says that severe fighting between the revolutionists and government troops has occurred at Anego, in the province of Cerro Largo. According to the government report the rebels were obliged to retreat.

HAVANA, July 12.—Reports from Sandti Spiritus confirm the rumor that Gen. Quiutan Bandera, who commanded the insurgents in the engagement on July 5th, Papye Heights, was killed during the fight. Captain General Weyler, who left Sancti Spiritus in the latter part of last week with the Asturias battalion, surprised a camp of the insurgents near Jarico, and a sharp engagement took place. Among the killed was the well-known Dr. Hernandez.

MONTREAL, July 12.—The cable from the Star's correspondent says: London, July 12.—The Dominion of Canada will have many important Chinese and Japanese visitors next month. Prince Arisugawa, the Mikado's special envoy to the Queen's jubilee, with a suite of nine, sailed by the Dominion liner Vancouver on Saturday to embark on the Empress of India from Vancouver. Chang Yien Huan, the Chinese special envoy and his suite of sixteen, will also return via Canada. Baron Rosen, the Russian minister to Japan, and suite sail on the Empress of India on Aug. 2.

BOSTON July 13.—A Herald despatch from Mexico, Mateo, states that the body of James Robertson, or Robinson, of Prince Edward Island, who mysteriously disappeared from Runford Falls, was found to-day floating in a small river in the town of Peru. One side of the man's face was badly bruised, and there are suspicions of foul play. It will be remembered at the time of the finding of the clothing Robertson's wallet was missing. Robertson has no friends, so far as is known, in this section of the country. The body was buried by the Peru authorities.

HALIFAX, July 13.—Is the appointment of Thos. Fyche to the management of the Merchants Bank of Canada the first step towards the amalgamation of the Merchants Bank of Canada, the Bank of Nova Scotia and the Bank of British Columbia? It looks as if it were. Rumors are rife that an attempt to secure such amalgamation is afoot. C. H. McLeod, cashier of the Bank of Nova Scotia, tells your correspondent that so far as his bank is concerned there is no truth in the report. But in opposition to this it is a fact that the Merchants bank people are buying up all the Bank of Nova Scotia stock they can obtain. There is no doubt at all in the minds of well-informed banking people here that the Merchants bank is anxious to accomplish the proposed amalgamation and thus place themselves on an equal footing with the Bank of Montreal with its capital of \$18,000,000 and its agencies all over Canada and in the United States cities. The combined capital of the three banks that it is proposed to amalgamate would be \$15,500,000. What opposition there will be in the east at least will likely come from the Bank of Nova Scotia. Shareholders who are satisfied with matters as they stand and would be averse to allowing the control of the bank of which they are so proud and which pays so well to pass to Montreal.

BOSTON, July 13.—The mysterious disease which has recently afflicted residents of Somerville, and which baffled the physicians, has been explained. The victims seemed to have been afflicted by ivy poisoning, the hands and arms reddening and swelling, but as a rule they could prove that they had not touched ivy. The employees of the Gypsy Moth Commission say that the whole trouble comes from touching the brown-tail moth, the new pest recently discovered in that vicinity. The commission is fighting the moth, and employees are killing them at the rate of 100,000 a day.

O'NEILL, Neb., July 13.—The Rev. Reuben Beackim, pastor of a negro church near this place, is urging that each member of his congregation put out one eye. Beackim himself put his peculiar teaching into practice some time ago with the result that inflammation has set in his remaining eye, and he is now threatened with total blindness. Notwithstanding that, several of his flock followed his example. Beackim declares that the Lord approves of one-eyed men, and backs up his contention with the twenty-second verse of the sixth chapter of Matthew, in which occurs the word: "If, therefore, thine eye be single, thy whole body shall be full of light." It looks as if many of Beackim's congregation would, literally, follow him blind.

LONDON, July 13.—The Times' Athens correspondent says a fight occurred at Candia, between British troops and Bashi Bazouks. A number were killed on both sides. The Bashi Bazouks have been summoned to surrender arms within four days. They have addressed a petition to the Sultan. The admirals of the foreign fleets sent five warships to Candia.

LONDON, July 13.—The appeal of the Sultan to the Emperor Francis Joseph, and the unusual fact that the text of the latter's reply has been published, taken together with Emperor William's advice, indicate that Abdul Hamid is seeking a pretext to enable him to resist successfully the demands of the Turkish war party by representing himself as compelled to comply with the demands of Europe.

PARIS, July 13.—The Supreme Council of Education has adopted a proposal by which foreigners are enabled to obtain doctor diplomas by undergoing an examination at French universities.
