

Ferry May Sail For Home Today

The S. S. Prince Edward Island, which has been tied up at Port aux Basques, Nfld., since late last week, will likely make her bid to reach her home port of Borden later this afternoon in the wake of the icebreaker Labrador.

Moncton C.N.R. officials said last night that another icebreaker may also act as an escort for the Prince Edward Island in order that she may be able to conserve her fuel supply for the trip home.

Out of action since Dec. 19th, the Prince Edward Island has been attempting to get through the ice clogged gulf since leaving Halifax after repairs Feb. 5th.

Officials say the car ferry is capable of breaking through the ice, as heavy as it is, but a lack of fuel capacity makes it impossible to make the run from Port aux Basques to Borden and still back the ice encountered en route.

year before the crop season begins, in the first part of April, you will know the lowest price based on costs, that the farmer will receive."

\$1.00 TRUCKLOAD
Speaking of present potato prices, Mr. Clark produced a cheque for 15 cents which he said had been paid a St. Mary's potato farmer for a truck load of potatoes. The cheque was drawn on a Murray River bank and if he were to cash it at Montague, the 15 cents exchange would reduce the amount to one cent.

"I recall when I was a young fellow during 1934, potatoes were selling for eight cents a bushel. Now twenty-five years have passed and under another Conservative government, a man gets one cent for a truckload," said Mr. Clark.

FREIGHT RATES

The Minister's freight rates were causing a serious threat to the economy of the Atlantic Provinces. He noted that while the nation's population since 1881 had increased by five times, that of the Island had decreased.

He said any small-gains which had been realized in agriculture, fisheries or other industries were offset largely by increasing freight rates in recent years. "If we could enjoy for our potatoes and farm products the same concessions the prairies for their wheat, our province would flourish," he said.

Mr. Clark noted the retirement of three members of the Department of Education during the past year: Dr. L.W. Shaw, Deputy Minister and Director of Education; Dr. Lily H. Seaman and Mr. William MacPhee. He spoke of the splendid contribution that all three had made for education in their native province.

The death occurred in the Charlottetown Hospital Monday of Timothy Rochford of Charlottetown in his 83rd year.

The late Mr. Rochford spent the best part of his life on the South Shore before coming to Charlottetown where he worked as a paper hanger and painter.

In 1932 he joined the crew of the Rocky Point ferry as pursuer, a position he held for almost 25 years.

The late Mr. Rochford was a member of the Knights of Columbus and the Benevolent Irish Society.

The funeral will be held Thursday at the Charlottetown Funeral Home to the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer. Interment will be in St. Martin's Cemetery South Shore.

TORONTO (CP)—The Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire announced Tuesday seven chapters have each adopted a school in the Leeward Islands, West Indies.

Chapters in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia have adopted schools in Antigua, St. Kitts, Nevis, Anguilla and Montserrat. Reference books have already been shipped and further educational supplies will be sent during the year.

Fur Coat Loaned British PM For Visit To Moscow

BELFAST (CP) — Viscount Brookeborough, prime minister of Northern Ireland, sent a fur coat to Prime Minister Macmillan Tuesday for use during his Moscow visit.

The coat originally belonged to the late Lord Byng of Vimy, to whom Lord Brookeborough was an aide when he commanded British and Canadian troops during the First World War. Later Lord Byng became governor-general of Canada.

Lord Byng, on his death, bequeathed the coat to Brookeborough, who decided to lend it to Macmillan for the visit to chilly Moscow.
