Mrs. Henry has had an enviable record in local drama circles for many years. Her talents were generously given to all groups who sought her services and her performances were always of an exceptionally high quality.

She did much to encourage drama among young people's groups and freely gave her time and ability to such causes.

Sputnik Over E. Canada Tonight

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Sputnik II will make a passage over Eastern Canada after sunset Friday night, the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory said Thursday night.

It will be the first of four passages visible in certain parts of the Western Hemisphere.

All passages in the evening now are in a north-northwest to south-southwest direction at an elevation of about 43 miles. The height makes the satellite visible for 1,000 miles on either side of the overhead pass.

The first passage over Eastern Canada starts about 5.35 p.m. EST (6:30 p.m. AST)

Union Critical Of Metal Tariffs

TORONTO (CP)—The International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (Ind.) Thursday criticized tariffs by both the United States and Canada preventing the free flow of non-ferrous metals.

Greek Cypriots Clash Among Themselves; Several Injured

By SHANE GUEBELIAN NICOSIA, Cyprus (Reuters) — Greek Cypriots, long at odds with Britons and Turks, clashed among themselves Thursday.

Leftists and right-wingers battled in Famagusta and two villages in east Cyprus.

Several persons were injured in street fights in the villages of Tricomos and Yenagra. At Famagusta, the clashes were minor and the rival groups broke up after their leaders addressed them.

The rivalry broke into the open Tuesday night with the slaying of two left-wing supporters. The left blamed the right-wing EOKA, an underground organization pledged to unite this British colony with Greece.

ORDER STRIKE Labor union leaders ordered a 48-hour general strike to protest the killings.

EOKA in the past has selected Turkish and British targets to further its aims. Greeks it claims betrayed the Greek cause also have been killed, but never before has it been accused in the

assassination of Greek political rivals. Even Archbishop Makarios — considered by Greek Cypriots to be the "saint" of the union-with-Greece movement — came in for verbal attacks in Thursday's left-wing demonstrations.

Leftists at Tricomos, birthplace of EOKA, shouted "down with Makarios" and "shame on Di. ghenis," Grivas' pseudonym. They clashed with students at the village high school.

At another demonstration, left-wingers carried placards reading, "Archbishop Makarios preaches unity while in Cyprus leftists are murdered."

Labor leaders here have called on the exiled archbishop to restrain the "terrorists."

ASKS FOR HARMONY Makarios, primate of the Cypriot Greek Orthodox Church, appealed Thursday night in Athens for "harmony and accord among Greek Cypriot people in the common struggle for freedom."

He said he regrets that the latest developments in Cyprus tend to present the Greek Cypriots as being divided.
