TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Montreal's Bribery Case.

MONTREAL, Aug. 24. The Customs' official bribery case was before the courts yesterday. Brossan, the complainant in the case, testified to the facts of the seizure of Ayer's goods at several places, including Halifax and St. John, to the value of about \$85,000. He then described how Walters, the accused Insurance Agent, offered him \$10,000 for the return and possession of Ayer's books, and the accused further said that the firm would give \$20,000 in order to beat the Government. The case is still on.

Gladstone's Recent Utterance.

LONDON, Aug. 24. In an address at Chislehurst on Saturday last, Gladstone said, "The enthusiasm manifested by the British friends of the Home Rule idea is an incentive to me to continue the struggle to secure the future happiness of Ireland. If the country desires to redeem its honor and to enable parliament to attend to the pressing business which requires imperial legislation, the Irish question must be settled at once." Gladstone will, it is believed, make a speech in the House in support of Parnell's motion that the Government should stop evictions in Ireland in certain cases.

Sir Michael Hicks-Beach Explains.

LONDON, Aug. 24. In the House of Commons Sir Michael Hicks-Beach said that the Government proposed to do two things, administer the law and consider a careful scheme capable of decent realization, in the direction of affording local self-government for Ireland. The scheme to be framed on a popular basis, in order to meet, so far as possible, the exigencies of Ireland, but it would also have to be in accordance with the decision of the people in the last election.

Disturbances in Belfast.

BELFAST, Aug. 24. Last evening a body of police tried to disperse a mob which had gathered on Shark Hill. The mob becoming infuriated threw stones at the policemen who returned them. The mob then completely wrecked the police barracks, which were defended by 20 policemen who did not fire upon the rioters. The military afterwards cleared the streets and the city is now quiet.

Echoes from Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Aug. 24. British Columbia marksmen will be represented for the first time by a team of nine men in the approaching Dominion rifle contest to take place here. Ottawa's eleven scored 118 in their first innings, and the Wanderers of Halifax 186 for five wickets down, in the cricket match played yesterday.

Ministerial Movements.

MONTREAL, Aug. 24. Ministers Bowell and Foster have arrived at Victoria, B. C., where they will remain for a week in order to investigate the coast fisheries and the working of the Customs' regulations.

Taking Precautionary Measures.

LONDON, Aug. 24. The Chinese Government have decided to despatch troops to Port Lazareff as a precautionary measure against the reported designs of Russia to seize that place.

The Record Again Broken.

LONDON, Aug. 24. George defeated Cummings in a mile running race at Lillebridge. The distance was covered in four minutes, twelve and three quarters seconds, being the fastest time on record.

Hanlan-Courtney Race.

ROCKWAY BEACH, Aug. 24. The Hanlan-Courtney race of three miles over the course in Jamaica Bay, for \$2,500, has been arranged and will be rowed on September 1st.

Presentation of Prizes.

HALIFAX, Aug. 24. The prizes won at the Provincial Rifle Association shooting were presented last night by Lieut.-Governor Ritchey.

A Belated Steamer.

HALIFAX, Aug. 24. This steamer Cartoll arrived from Boston this morning 24 hours late. She encountered heavy weather and much fog which detained her.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Aug. 24. The High Court of Foresters are now holding their annual meeting in this city.

Too Calm for Yachting.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24. The weather was too calm for a trial yacht race to take place yesterday.
