# Giants Outnumber Chicago to Cubs 9-2

Tuesday, for a total of 363 in Rookie second basemen Ken Hubbs tied a National League fielding record Tuesday but it made little difference to the crushing San Francisco Giants who smashed Chicago Cubs 9-2.

Hubbs, a 29-year-old, went through his 73rd consecutive game without an error to tie the record set by Red Schoendienst of St. Louis in 1960. Hubbs handled six chances.

# Willingdon Cup Captured By Ontario 4-Man Team

LONDON, Ont. (CP) — Cohesive play of Tuesday for Ontario's four-man team in the interprovincial team golf matches, and the steady Ontario brushed aside fast-crumbing opposition to win the Willingdon Cup for the 18th time in its 36-year history.

Ontario came out of the two-day 36-hole championship struggle with an aggregate medal score of 276, wiping out a two-stroke deficit down the final nine.

Ontario had a 13-stroke margin over Alberta, widest margin in the annual team event since 1955 when British Columbia beat Alberta.

Saskatchewan and Nova Scotia ended in a fifth-place tie with 603. Quebec followed with 617 and the New Brunswick Prince Edward Island team was last with 630.

Meanwhile the qualifying round for the Canadian Amateur championship starting at match play today was won by Phil Browne's pair of 75. The Manitoba team had a 77 for a 165 total, one stroke better than Phil Browne's pair of 75. The Ontario team had a 77 for a 154 total, Ontario got hot on the back nine and we went the other way.

Bill Pridall, 44-year-old veteran who shot a dazzling 67 in the first round, is 10 strokes higher in the second. He had no

Alberta was steady enough to move into second spot. Keith Alexander, was low man with 120. John Kilburn and Doug Silverberg each had 147 and Bob Wylie 140.

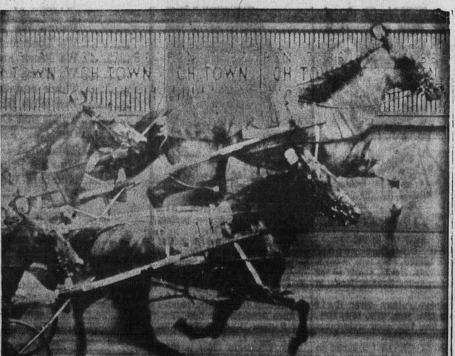
