Pedigree of Cows.

Conrad Wilson, in Harper's Magazine for January says pedigree is a very essential element in the value of cows. But it is also true and no less important to know that grade animals in a well-managed dairy can be made, as a rule, quite as productive as thorough-breeds, and often more so. Yet this does not at all imply that the latter can be dispensed with, for we can not have a good quality of grades without a good strain of blood to start from. While it is conceded that pedigree is one of the factors in the dairy are not the sole outcome of any single condition. They depend not merely on the capacity and breed of the cow, but also and equally on the intelligence and good management of the owner; and what is equally true, but seldom considered, even the capacity of the cow is itself to a large extent the product of her skill.
