A SIGN OF THE TIMES.

SUMMERSIDE is beginning to be alive again. The fall trade bids fair to be brisk, and as far as the farmers are concerned, profitable. Oats are in good demand at 2s 6d per bushel. Potatoes sell for 1s 4d; barley is dull, good two-rowed bringing no more than 6d. There are quite a number of vessels at the wharves; three new ones—Capt. Richards', Mr. A. MacMillan's, and Mr. J. A. McDonald's, all loading with oats for the Home Market. The "Princess of Wales" was on Wednesday morning literally crammed with freight. She took on board at Summerside about 400 Sheep, 200 barrels of Oysters, and 200 bushels Barley; besides a horse or two. Several horses were left behind, there being no room for them in the boat. The town to-day is quite a different looking place from the dull, dreary spot it was two or three weeks ago.

GEORGE WIGGINS, Esq., sowed this spring a half bushel of wheat on a little more than half an acre of ground. The return has been an extraordinary one. Though the grain while growing and after it was cut sustained serious damage, yet Mr. Wiggins informs us that he has had fourteen and a half bushels of clean grain from the half bushel's sowing. The wheat was sown on the 6th of June, on potatoe land. It is of the kind called Canada Wheat. This looks like the "Good old times" coming again.

REV. W. R. FRANKLIN acknowledges the receipt of one pound five shillings from Hon. J. R. Gardiner, in aid of the Rev. Mr. Chinniquy's mission.

Very Latest Telegrams!

London, Oct 13 Much fault is found with the selection of the Foreign Office of Edward Thornton, now Minister at Brazil, to represent Great Britain at Washington, as announced last week in the London Times. The opinion is generally expressed that none but a diplomatist of the highest rank should be sent to the United States to fill the post occupied by Sir Frederick Bruce.

Dublin, Oct 13th The apprehensions of another Fenian landing caused by the reports that suspicious vessels had been seen hovering off the shore at Kerry and other portions of the Irish coast are subsiding.

The war vessels which have been guarding the Southern and Eastern coasts of Ireland for some time past will be withdrawn with the exception of one or two iron-clads.

Florence, Oct 13th Garibaldi has named his son Menotti Generalissimo of the revolutionary forces engaged in the movement on Rome.

It is stated that bands of invaders have been driven over the frontier by the Papal forces and disbanded by the National Forces.

London, Oct 14th The continued agitation in Italy and the determined disposition evinced by the party of action to persist in the attempted invasion of the Roman territory, causes much financial uneasiness and depression in this city and Paris.

New York, Oct 16 Lieut. Lloyd, of the Government of Liberia, who has just arrived here, states that there has been much excitement and distress in Liberia, owing to the stopping of trade in what is known as country cloth. This is a cotton blanket which is almost universally worn by the natives. The slaves in the interior of Liberia, who were formerly held in subjection by native kings or Chiefs, have rebelled and obtained their freedom. Gold 144.
