## In Memoriam

### MRS. GORDON W. DAWSON

At peace with the world and in resignation to the Divine Will, Mary Bell Victoria Rogerson, dearly beloved wife of Gordon W. Dawson, Summerside, P. E. I., passed to her eternal reward on June second, 1939.

Mrs. Dawson was born at Craupad on May 24th, 1877, attended Craupad public school from which at an early age she matriculated to Prince of Wales College, and graduated therefrom in the spring of 1893. She taught school very acceptably at Tryon, Tryon West and Cape Traverse, all within a few miles of the home of her childhood.

In January 1903, some months after his return from Klondike, she married Gordon W. Dawson to whom she was engaged before his departure for the Yukon where he spent five years working in the gold fields. Through the combined industry and thrift of her husband and herself they established one of the finest farm homes on Prince Edward Island. On retiring from farming in 1923 Mr. and Mrs. Dawson came to live in Summerside where they resided with peace and good will towards everyone.

Blessed with Christian virtues, the late Mrs. Dawson was a respected and esteemed citizen of Summerside and an earnest and enthusiastic worker in "The Ladies Aid" of the Presbyterian Church. In her home she was a generous and entertaining hostess and here her society friends were pleased to have frequent meetings. Everyone was welcome at Mr. and Mrs. Dawson's home.

Her painful sickness of some months' duration she bore patiently, comforted by the frequent visits of her loving pastor, she never lost hope for the fulfillment of the Divine Promise.

Her funeral on Sunday June 4th, was largely attended. A short service at the house was conducted and beautifully conducted, and included at her special request, the singing of "The Old Rugged Cross" by Mr. Charles Rogers of which Mr. Rogers furnished a lovely rendition.

The funeral procession to Tryon Presbyterian Church was large and impressive, indicative of the esteem in which the late Mrs. Dawson was held by her friends many of whom came long distances to attend her last respects to one so deserving of their esteem.

At the Church, filled to overflowing, Rev. Mr. Verwoit preached an appropriate sermon that was listened to with appreciative attention by hundreds of listeners of various sects. Thereafter in the Tryon Presbyterian Church, near the scenes of her early life and labor, was respectfully consigned to mother earth all that was mortal of the fine woman, her good services to the community and Mr. Verwoit officiating at the grave.

As per her request the pall bearers were J. F. Arnott, Harold Macdonald, W. B. MacArthur, William Toombs, Douglas Bell, and Russel Howatt. The bereaved husband has the sympathy of all in the loss of his beloved and worthy partner.
