

# Beautiful Algeria Torn By Variety of Conflicts

The Associated Press spotlight this week describes Algeria two years after she gained independence from France. It also discusses a new breed of Chinese in Hong Kong, the introduction of an extradition treaty between Brazil and the United States and Japanese cost-of-living increases.

They weren't here any more. Barely 100,000 French remain, and those for the most part have a feeling of insecurity created by secret arrests, property seizures and harassments that go on despite the government's expressed desire to cultivate ties with France.

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Indignant over price inflation, Sato later confessed he found political opponents easier to deal with than the housewives. Judging from growing complaints he was right.

While they legally couldn't ship anybody home, the police found they were able to persuade many to accept a voluntarily one-way trip to New York instead of a possible jail sentence.

Last year the Algerian share of the oil income was about \$200,000,000. Ben Bella wants it at least doubled in contracts for the oil, development of the country will be a long, hard pull.

The United States has chosen to do it on the basis of socialist state ownership of much of the national production. All land is nationalized.

HONG KONG (AP)—A new breed of Chinese—a sort of "lost generation"—is evolving in this British colony on China's coast.

The breed's chief characteristic is uncertainty. Its philosophy of life seems to be: Eat, drink and be merry for you never know what tomorrow may bring.

For the young people of Hong Kong, along with the youth of many parts of Asia, are beginning to worry about their future.

Subconsciously they are beginning to feel more strongly than ever the presence of a power that could play a big part in deciding their future—Communist China.

Peking's efforts on the ideological front have been particularly striking.
