Action Under Fish And Game Act

Considerable interest has been aroused in the Souris area regarding a case concerned with the Fish and Game Act and involving a defendant Mr. William MacMillan, of East Lake.

Evidence heard on behalf of the prosecution yesterday before Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet included that of Spurgeon Jenkins, Charlettown; John White, Montague and Ivor Stewart all officers under the Fish and Game Act.

MacMillan gave evidence in his own defence. The Magistrate took the case under advisement and will give his decision one week. Mr. J. P. Nicholson appeared for the Crown and Mr. Lester P. O'Donnell for the defendant.

The case arose out of information laid by Provincial Fish and Game officers.

Army's History Of Second World War Being Published

OTTAWA (CP) — The army's official history of its role in the Italian campaign of the Second World War will be published Sept. 15.

It is an 807-page record of the 1st Canadian Corps—the 1st and 5th Divisions—from the invasion of Sicily in July, 1943, to its transfer to Northwest Europe in the spring of 1945.

Author is Lt.-Col. Gerald W. L. Nicholson, deputy director of the historical section of the general staff.

The volume, entitled 'The Canadians in Italy 1943-45,' is the second volume of the army's Second World War history.

The first, written by Col. C. P. Stacey, director of the historical section, covered army organization, training and operations in Canada, Britain and the Pacific throughout the war. It was published last December.

A third volume, now being prepared, deals with the campaign in Northwest Europe in 1944-45. A fourth will deal with Canadian military policy.

Canada's Trade With France Not What Should Be

GEN. CANADA'S TRADE WITH FRANCE (CP) — French Ambassador Francis Lacoste said Wednesday that trade between France and Canada is "not what it should be."

He said imports and exports are about balanced and represent only slightly more than one half of one per cent of Canada's total trade. That figure he called "ludicrous."

"Trade is not increasing," he said. "I wish it were. As it is it is not satisfactory."

Mr. Lacoste will leave here today after a three-day visit. He told a press conference "We have to find out what we can most readily market here. France is always ready to sell perfumes, dresses and wines, but you can't have our whole trade based on that."

HALIFAX (CP) — Health Minister Geoffrey Stevens said Wednesday he is hopeful a health insurance plan can be evolved for Nova Scotia and that the government will have the support of the medical profession in bringing it about.

Mr. Stevens, speaking at Nova Scotia Medical Society luncheon, said he "was extremely hopeful" a method could be found of "underwriting illness" that would be fair to everyone.

ed by the course. They also voiced their appreciation for help given teachers seeking it through the teachers' aid by Miss Estelle Bowness, general secretary of the Teachers Federation.
