The Subway Progressing.

We are pleased to learn that Staff Commander Maxwell, R. N., commanding the Newfoundland and Quebec Survey, has been ordered to make a sounding of the depths of water between Capes Traverse and Tormentine, on the line of the proposed Subway.

The Recent Seizure.

THE N. Y. Independent editorially remarks: "We may be mistaken, but we do not see that there is anything in the recent seizure, by the Canadian authorities, of the fishing schooner David J. Adams, that need to make the eagle scream very loudly."

The President's Purpose.

THE WHOLE FISHERY QUESTION TO BE TREATED BY THE STATE DEPARTMENT.

A Washington correspondent of the New York Herald says: "The President, it is understood, is very anxious that the fishery question shall be settled upon some other basis than by enacting what may be construed as retaliatory measures."

Cardinal Taschereau.

OFFICIAL INTIMATION FROM ROME. His Eminence Cardinal Taschereau received from Europe by the English mail on Tuesday last, the official notification informing him that it is the intention of the Sovereign Pontiff to formally create him a Cardinal in the Consistory which will be held about the 7th June next.

On the 19th inst. a story is told of a man, Peabody, of Boston. One afternoon, a violent gust of wind was blowing, and he was walking with the wind and sand in getting off the car at the Revere House.

The Fisheries Matter.

THE PART OF FRANCE IN THE GREAT CANADIAN QUESTION—FRENCH OPINION.

THE New York Herald of Monday devotes almost two entire pages to the discussion of this question and publishes a map showing the coast lines of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Cape Breton, and the lines of limitation of the fisheries as interpreted by the United States and Canada.

Its Paris correspondent sends a lengthy cablegram which says that the fishery question is watched by the French Government with the closest attention as thousands of families on the coasts of Brittany and Normandy earn a livelihood by the fishing industry on the banks of Nova Scotia and Newfoundland.

M. Durand, a prominent shipowner, said to the correspondent that a common action by France and the United States would certainly be most efficacious. The most serious question for us is the bait question. Our fishermen fish usually a long way from the French possessions of St. Pierre and Miquelon.

Another prominent shipowner said: "By the old treaties our fishermen have rights enabling them to establish at certain points on the Newfoundland coast establishments for preparing and drying fish. But our fishermen who exercise these rights are so harassed and annoyed by the British authorities that practically it is no privilege at all."

M. Postel, a shipowner of Cherbourg, says: "I think that a joint diplomatic action of the United States and France would be most opportune. The fishery industry, moreover, is the sole vital source of the recruitment of our merchant marine."

An ex-cabinet minister said: "I hope the American Government will not allow its hand to be forced or be led astray from the main issue by getting involved into a useless discussion of technical trivialities about the seizure of the David J. Adams. The broad, vital question is that your New England fishermen have just cause of complaint against England."

There is great excitement here over the Scott Act, which came into force on the 1st inst. Ten convictions have been secured, and fines of \$50 and costs were inflicted in each case.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Discussing the National Policy

On motion to go into supply, Hon. Mr. Mitchell spoke against certain points in the National Policy, especially the duties on coal, corn, cornmeal, flour and wheat. He moved an amendment in accordance with his speech.

Sensational Journalism.

A despatch in a Boston paper stated that the schooner Augusta Herrick, of New York, was about to sail for the Bay of Fundy on a fishing trip—that the Captain stated that he never would be captured and that the schooner was armed with two cannons.

Running the Gauntlet.

A Canso despatch to the "Herald" says: The Gloucester fisherman Lizzie J. Greenleaf put into this port on Wednesday with a permit to procure bait. During the night she weighed anchor, went to the fishing traps at Fox Island, then got all the bait she wanted and put to sea.

Prohibitory Measures.

In the House to-day Breckenridge, of Arkansas, called up the bill providing that, for a period of five years, no mackerel other than Spanish mackerel caught between the 1st of March and 1st of June shall be imported or landed in the United States.

Checking the Fishermen.

The schooners Jennie and Julia arrived here from Eastport, and reported at the Custom House, wishing to be admitted to enter as a trader. This the Collector declined to allow, but was willing to allow him to enter as a fisherman, as he had nets and other fishing gear on board.

Rushing the Cruisers.

Orders have been received from Ottawa to fit out the cruisers with the greatest despatch.

The Prospect Brightening.

The Government "whips" report that 225 Liberals are pledged to vote for the Home Rule bill along with 86, Parnellites, and that its supporters are increasing daily. They now count upon carrying the bill by a majority of 15.

A Sudden Call.

Newton L. Mackay, Q. C., ex-M. P., dropped dead on the streets of Sydney to-day. He was a prominent lawyer since 1867. He ran eight elections in Cape Breton County.

Enforcing the Scott Act.

There is great excitement here over the Scott Act, which came into force on the 1st inst. Ten convictions have been secured, and fines of \$50 and costs were inflicted in each case.

Mount Etna in Eruption.

The eruption of Mount Etna is increasing in large proportions and there is serious danger to the town of Monterosso from the flow of lava.

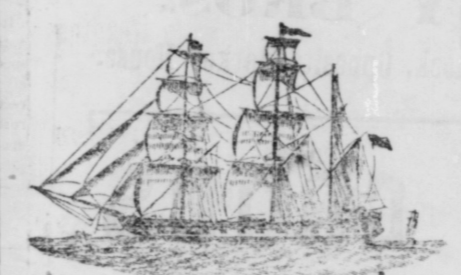
