Industrial Output Show Decline

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's industrial output in July and the first seven months of the year declined about three per cent compared with the corresponding periods a year ago.

Industrial production is measured by a composite index published monthly by the bureau of statistics. In July the index stood at 239.8 as against 247 in the same month in 1953. The bureau said Tuesday the main reason for the July decline was a decrease of nearly six per cent in the output of manufactured goods. However, mineral production rose nine per cent above last July and electricity and gas output increased by six per cent.

In the manufacturing field output of durable goods in July declined nearly 11 per cent compared with last year. Wood products showed a slight increase but production of transportation equipment and electrical apparatus decreased.

Output of non-metallic minerals showed a moderate gain, but production of iron and steel products was below output in July last year.

Reporter Who 'Communed' With King Busy

OTTAWA (CP)—The retired New York Times reporter who says he communed with the late prime minister Mackenzie King from beyond the grave is a busy man these days—answering the telephone.

Percy J. Philip said Tuesday people are calling day and night. Some are cranks and some are spiritualists. One man asked what brand of whisky Mr. Philip recommended. But most simply want the text of the address he made last Friday over the CBC.

It was in this talk that he told of communicating with Mr. King, known to be interested in spiritualism before his death in 1950. Mr. Philip said the contact took place last June as he sat on a garden bench among the crumbling stonework at Mr. King's Gatineau hills summer home at Kingsmere, Que., 10 miles north-west of Ottawa.

Since the broadcast many persons have visited Kingsmere. Some have sat silent on the bench in an apparent effort to duplicate Mr. Philip's effort, but without apparent success. The Ottawa press corps has been engaged in a bit of a journalistic pondering about their former colleague's broadcast. CBC chairman David Dunton told questioners the CBC would take responsibility for broadcasting "exactly what he said" adding that what Mr. Philip had said "should be looked at very carefully."

Mr. Philip thinks so too. He said one must read the text to get the full meaning of his remarks. For that reason he said he is having some printed to give to those interested.

He recalled that he had begun his address by saying this is a "fantasy" that listeners may not believe it and that he hardly believes it himself. But he knew he had gone through an unusual experience.

Montague Lets Sidewalk And Drainage Contract

"At a special meeting of the Montague Town Council Saturday, the contract for the construction of sidewalk and drainage system on the north side of the town was let to William Whiteway, Murray River, the only other tender was that of County Construction Co. Ltd.

The section of sidewalk to be constructed will extend from approximately Arthur MacNeill's home to Daniel MacDonald's home, roughly 500 feet. It is proposed to raise this low section to the level of the main street so as to prevent water lodging on the sidewalk.

The drainage system will extend from Vere Beck and Sun to H. L. MacGregor's store, and then down Brook Street. The length will be piped and two, and possibly three manholes if necessary will be installed. It is understood that the work will begin in the very near future.

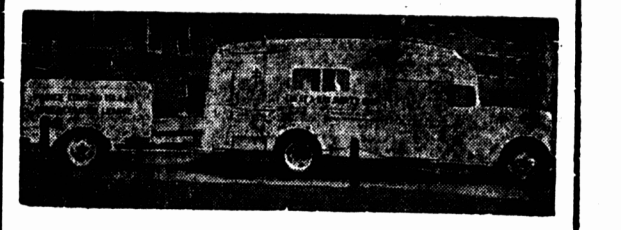
