IN MEMORIAM
JOHN A. McLEOD

On Sunday, March 18, 1951, there passed away to his eternal rest at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Wendell Mayhew, Crapaud, John A. McLeod, in his 80th year. Prior to last fall Mr. McLeod lived in Breadalbane where he made a host of friends.

Mr. McLeod was born in Hartsville and was the son of the late Alexander McLeod and Mrs. McLeod, the former Mary Matheson of Rose Valley. His parents died while he was very young and he was brought up in Rose Valley.

Early in life he went to Boston where he learned the steam fitting trade. He progressed rapidly in the business and was for many years a mechanical engineer with the New York firm of Admiral and Company, a large contracting company which did heating and ventilating jobs over most of the United States.

As travelling superintendent for the firm he was their chief trouble shooter for many years. Later before falling health forced him to retire from active work he was superintendent of the firm's supply shop on Long Island. On his retirement he returned to Breadalbane in this province until last fall.

Possessing a friendly, kindly and cheerful disposition he was highly esteemed by all who knew him. Mr. McLeod was a man of outstanding christian character, deeply interested in every worthy cause, especially in the work and welfare of the Church of which he was a member for many years. He will be greatly missed by his many friends and acquaintances but more particularly in the family circle of his home.

Although suffering from a painful and severe illness for a number of years, he was never known to murmur or complain but endured his suffering with the christian spirit of patience and fortitude.

Left to cherish his memory are his devoted wife, formerly Catherine Marion Matheson of Rose Valley, one son Gordon of Charlottetown, and a daughter Myrtle, Mrs. Wendell Mayhew of Crapaud. There are also two children by a former marriage, Charles A. and Jane, Mrs. Sheldon Hobby, both of New York City.

The funeral was held on Tuesday, March 20th. A short service was held at the home, then to Breadalbane United Church. The service was conducted by his Pastor, Rev. W. B. MacPhail who spoke words of comfort to the bereaved family. The Masonic order conducted an impressive service for the departed brother.

The hymns sung were The Lord's My Shepherd, Rock of Ages and Asleep in Jesus.

A vocal duet, "The Old Rugged Cross" was rendered by Mary Morrison and Shirley MacDonald.

The pallbearers were Hedley Woodside, Kenneth Doull, Leonard Todd, William Anderson, Kenneth Graham, Donald McLure.

Interment was in the Breadalbane Cemetery.
