

Vandals Responsible For Fires In S'side

SUMMERSIDE — A spokesman for the Summerside fire department said there were indications that two minor fires here Thursday night were the work of vandals.

The department answered four calls, two fires and two false alarms in what was described as the busiest Halloween in years.

The Miscoche and St. Eleonora fire departments received separate calls concerning fires in Lot 16 but both were the work of pranksters.

An ambulance from the Bowden Funeral Home in Summerside was called to the Lot 16 area on a false injury.

The St. Eleonora village commission last night offered a \$200 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of any persons planning false fire calls in the area.

Commission chairman Earle Cannon yesterday said the \$200 reward still stands.

Two police reported their seven patrolling cars had a comparatively quiet Halloween compared to other years.

Three windows were broken in Summerside including one measuring 12 by 20 inches in the police station and one in the home of councillor George Key

Halloween Is Nightmare For Family At Canoe Cove

Halloween was more like a nightmare than an occasion for innocent pranks to a family in the Canoe Cove area, the father of the family said Friday.

Mr. and Mrs. Perley Shaw and nine children were practically besieged in their home by a gang of men who broke three windows, hurled rocks and large stones, and even tried to break down the side of the house with a 10-foot long log.

When the night finally ended a car was found upside down and a dog lay dead.

At the height of the assault Mr. Shaw and family took refuge in the upstairs of the building. There was no telephone in the house, but Mr. Shaw was able to get one of his sons out a window and the lad ran to a neighbour's a quarter of a mile distant to summon aid.

Mr. Shaw is employed at the government garage, but was hospitalized during the summer for a leg injury.

One child is recuperating from a fractured skull.

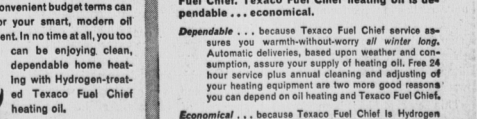
