DEFENCELESS JOHANNESBURG.

Artillery, writes an "army man" in the Sunday Special, will surely have a commanding influence in the coming war—if war there is to be. This is fully realized by our military authorities, and it is seen in the fact that three field batteries are at this moment stationed at Newcastle, on the frontier, while the first step, if trouble looms nearer, will be to despatch considerable reinforcements of artillery to South Africa. Long range fire seems an almost certain method of overcoming Boer marksmanship; it is difficult to see how their rifles could serve them against Lyddite shells dropped in on them from a safe distance. It is generally understood now that had the ill-fated Sir George Colley made large use of his artillery, such as it was, before attack, the result might have been different. The action of his rocket tubes was very effective, and these demoralising missiles did great execution among the Boer horses before the fight at Lang's Neck. With all this, war in the Transvaal would undoubtedly be a serious undertaking, and no one in their senses would enter upon it without fully appreciating the cost. One whole army corps at least would be required in the first line with a second in reserve, and the pressure entailed thereby upon our regular forces would be very severe. Perhaps the most potent argument in favor of maintaining peace is the defenceless condition of the British population at Johannesburg. This numbers some 20,000 odd, men, women and children, and they are at the mercy of the Boer guns. It would be impossible to withdraw them in less than a fortnight, and they remain practically so many hostages in the hands of the foe. It is too much to hope that the Boer authorities would forego this terrible advantage.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

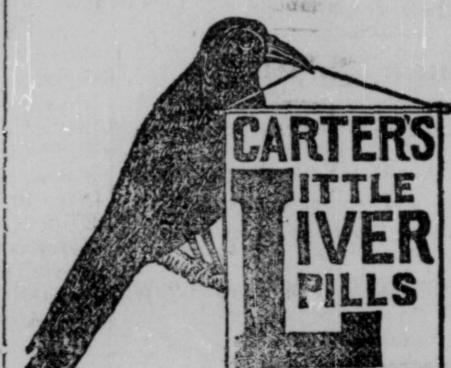
—Those who want to see the Belfast and Murray Harbor railway a reality ought to protest against the Liberal gerrymander which will make the representatives of Queen's and King's counties politically independent of the proposed railway.

—A canal commission appointed by Governor Roosevelt, of New York State, has been looking over the Canadian canals. Its members are reported to have said that these links in our waterway are a revelation to them; that, if Montreal provides adequate terminal facilities the present Erie canal will not be able to compete with the St. Lawrence system; and that it might be well to abandon the Erie canal altogether, and allow the western traffic of the United States to go by the Canadian route. Commenting on these statements, the New York Tribune says:

"The simple facts are that for years past Canada has been improving her transportation facilities in a far-seeing, enterprising, energetic, and liberal manner. She has meant business at every step. She has been animated by the spirit that has made the British Empire the greatest commercial power the world has ever seen."

—The Queen of Madagascar setting fashions for Parisiennes! Think of it! It sounds like a Gilbert and Sullivan opera idea, but it is a positive fact. The dusky Ranavolo was not permitted to visit Paris, but the delicately embroidered gauze which trimmed the gown she wore when she arrived in Marseilles caused such a sensation that the dethroned sovereign was besieged by dressmakers almost as soon as she had left the ship. To one dressmaker who won Her Majesty's favor by bringing a number of beautiful Paris costumes for the Queen to try on, Ranavolo gave a square yard of the wonderful embroidered gauze and the modiste now occupies a host of church embroidery workers to copy the stitches and try to reproduce the odd coloring of the original. The very newest styles are so flat and severe that the gayly colored Malgache embroidery is hailed as a welcome relief.

—In 1897 the Senate threw out the Drummond deal. The result is that we now have a new contract, which, although excessive in its terms, saves half a million in the purchase at the Drummond and another half million in the rental of a portion of the Grand Trunk line. In 1898 the Senate threw out the Yukon deal. The result is that instead of giving 4,000,000 acres of good land for a railway now known to be useless, we have the 4,000,000 acres, for sale at a price set upon them by Mr. Sifton, \$10 an acre. In 1899 the Senate threw out the Government's retroactive expropriation bill. As a result the Ministers, who sought the right to expropriate private property, to hold it for any length of time, and then to cast it back upon the owner in whole or in part, are deprived of the tremendous power over the possessions of the people that they wanted to wield. The Mail and Empire well remarks that "it is the Government, not the Senate, that needs abolition."

HOW TO GET TO CHARLOTTETOWN

The steamer Halifax leaves Boston for Charlottetown every Saturday at noon and will be due at Charlottetown on Monday night. On the following Tuesday at one she will leave on return to Boston. Halifax and Port Hawkesbury are called at every trip. Passengers may take the steamer at any of the ports mentioned. The Halifax will be supplemented by the Grand Duchess later in the season.

The steamer City of Ghent plys between Halifax and Charlottetown each week, calling at several ports en route. She is due here every Thursday.

The steamers Coban, Bonavista, Campana, Tiber and Polino, of Montreal, also make Charlottetown a port of call.

Passengers for this Province coming by way of Pictou are brought to Charlottetown by the steamer Princess. Those coming by way of Point Du Chene connect with the steamer Northumberland, and may come through to Charlottetown by the mail special which leaves Summerside each evening immediately after the steamer reaches that port.
